

Keep going!

On Hogmanay, Annie and I climbed the highest mountain in Donegal - Errigal. The summit of Errigal stands almost 2,500 feet above sea-level and it takes about two hours to walk to the top. It was a fine day and hundreds of other people had the same idea as ourselves and so there was a snake of people making their way up through the boggy base to the dry scree slopes above.

It was good to pause and chat while trying to find extra puff for the next bit of the climb and it was fun meeting people from other parts of Ireland as well as further afield. I find that climbing a mountain requires as much psychological resolve as physical fitness. I have a habit of reassuring myself that just beyond the next escarpment lies the summit. Of course, it's not true and so I have to keep talking to myself all the way up!

Close to the summit something very unexpected happened. A light mist was rolling in from the south and the sun was shining brightly behind us. Suddenly, we became aware of a giant moving figure projected out over the valley to the base of the next mountain. The figure was moving with me because the 'ghost' was my shadow. The effect is known as a Brocken spectre and it was my first experience of it. As we stood in amazement gazing at the spectre, we heard a clatter beneath us. A woman walker had noticed the spectre too and had taken her eyes off where the next step would be and down she went. Fortunately she remained on the path and got away with nothing more than a few bruises. She was on holiday from France and with little English, we had all sorts of problems explaining to her what a Brocken spectre was!

The summit surpassed expectations and when we eventually descended the mountain we were delighted with a good day's exercise and stunning scenery.

The mountain journey parallels experiences in our Christian pilgrimage as well. We scarcely know at the beginning how much discipline we will require as we progress in life. We do need to remind ourselves that potential blessing lies beyond the next rise, and so to keep going when sometimes we might be inclined to stop or give up. We need to be aware of the danger of distractions and learn not to be over-occupied with the "Brocken spectres". We can't afford to lose our footing and stumble.

As I write this letter the third year of vacancy in the Parish has just begun. 'Vacancy' is such an inappropriate term because it implies that nothing is happening in Parish life and that is far from true. Your vacancy is full of many good things as well as challenges. I would like to encourage you all to keep going. God's faithfulness is the most reliable factor in our lives and potential blessing awaits beyond the next rise. Don't be distracted from your walk and stay together encouraging one another.

May God continue to bless you all,

Aberlour Parish Church Walking Group

Put SPRING into your step!

Starting Point: Victoria Bridge Car park, Aberlour We walk along Speyside Way to Delmore, then to Glenallachie, to Linn Falls to Aberlour. Some uphill; short steep section before Linn Falls. Narrow paths in places. Distance: 4 miles. Longer option: From above Linn Falls to Fairy Knowe, Hatton, Knockside, and back via Braes of Allachie. Significant uphill stretch. Extra 2 miles. This is a lovely circular walk in our immediate neighbourhood.

Saturday, 11th April: Bin of Cullen

Car Share walk. Please come in no more than 2 or 3 in each car. To get to starting point, from Cullen Square go west up Grant Street. Take 2nd left at top into South Deskford St. for Cullen Old Kirk. At end turn right into Cathay Terrace. Go right again at signpost to Cullen Kirk. Drive to the end of the road into large car park near Old Kirk.

We will then drive in half the cars from Cullen Old Kirk to the foot of the Bin (back to Square, turn right onto A98. Leave town and take first right onto B9018. After 3km turn right – signed Hill of Maud. After 2 km reach track on right signed Seafield Estates – park here)

Route Climb hill (627 feet ascent). Not too steep. Marvellous open view from top of hill. Descend to Cullen through varied woodland.

Distance: 5 miles approx.

Saturday 9th May: Christian Aid Sponsored Walk

She flew Nimrod aircraft from Kinloss until, tragically, she developed arthritis and had to give up flying. She was with the RAF for 16 years.



The November meeting was attended by Alan McIntosh and Gordon Pirie who are Leaders from Buckie 1st Boys Brigade. They gave a very interesting talk about the Brigade in Buckie, which boasts over 200 boys from age 6 to teenagers. The leaders and helpers are volunteers and they are to be commended for maintaining such strong and enthusiastic membership. The Boys Brigade are one of the six special projects currently supported by the Guild.

In December the Guild enjoyed a lovely Christmas lunch at the Aberlour Hotel. At January's meeting Carol Matheson introduced Ann Hay from Moray Community Services to talk to us about the local BALL Group (Be Active Life Long), which meets in Aberlour on Mondays from 10-12pm. Carol & Ann showed such enthusiasm for the Ball Groups and quite a few of our members had already joined.


FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT -24 February to 7 March

The Telford Bridge has seen a lot of activity over the last year and numerous weddings and functions have taken place on it. The feedback is always very positive about what a fantastic venue it is for such things. At present we still have no control over these events as The Bridge currently remains the responsibility of the Moray Council. However, we do try to make it clean and tidy for locals and visitors to enjoy.

The paths previously cleared to expose the stone walls are growing back as mother nature reclaims the sand banks, and we will need to be vigilant to keep invasive plants, such as Himalayan Balsam, under control in the coming years. Wildflower seeds and spring bulbs were planted last year and spring 2020 should be a riot of colour.

The Spirit of Speyside Whisky Festival toposcope was built last autumn and adds an interesting feature for locals and tourists alike to get their bearings. Thanks to the Whisky Festival team for the toposcope and to Gary Laing Stonemasons Rothes for the excellent work and finish. To further enhance the area, we have applied for funding for some new picnic benches and other garden work.

The fencing on the Banffshire side is in a sorry state of repair and we are looking at funding streams to enable replacement. If you feel you would like to sponsor a single fence post, or a 3 meter length of fence board, then we will consider placing the names of the people who have sponsored a fence post or section of boarding onto a document of public subscription, much the same as they did to fund the original bridge, and publish this on the web page. To replace the fencing will require 55 fence posts and about 300 meters of boarding and anyone interested should contact myself.

We hope to have postcards, cards and posters of the bridge available to buy soon; keep looking on the webpage and Facebook pages for details.

Plans for this year are well underway and we hope to be able to provide information boards in the near future. Discussions are still ongoing with Moray Council concerning future responsibility for the bridge, however this is slow and will take many more months before we are in a position to ensure the future maintenance and protection of Telford's Craigellachie Bridge.

In the meantime, if you would like to join the small but dedicated team who meet on the first Saturday of every month, weather dependent, to do some light clearing up and litter picking around the approaches to the bridge then please get in touch on the Facebook page or look out for updates on FB about any activity. We hope to have the approaches back to their former glory by spring and definitely in time for the Whisky Festival.

It is unfortunate that since Christmas we have had two incidents of damage to the grass slope near the Banffshire side of the bridge. Someone appears to get some pleasure out of driving their car over the grass and wheel spinning up the slope. Not exactly crime of the decade, but if you do happen to come across it happening when out walking please note the registration number and pass details back to the group so we can have some appropriate advice given to the culprits.

Please drop by for a walk around the bridges, or the loop to the improved Speyside Way, and if you are feeling generous drop a coin in the donation box to support the work of the Friends of Craigellachie Bridge. Every penny helps.

ABERLOUR HORTICULTURAL & INDUSTRIAL SOCIETY

At the Annual General Meeting we had to unfortunately take the decision to put the Society into Abeyance. This was due to the lack of Committee Members to run the Society and also the existing Committee getting on in years. As a consequence there will be no further Spring Shows.

We hope that a new Committee can be formed in the future to restart what was part of the village history with the Society running from the 1890's.

Taxman Taketh @----But Taxman Giveth @,

Yes its' true—this anonymous character known as "Taxman", (not always the most popular member of the establishment), gives as well as takes. However, Taxman will only give if we give first, and this is the basic principle of the Gift-Aid (G/A) scheme.

Gift-Aid is available to organisations that Taxman has categorised as "charitable" such as the church. And so Taxman has allowed the charitable organisation i.e Aberlour Parish Church, to reclaim 25% on any donations (i.e our offerings) given to it---provided the donor is a U.K taxpayer. Why does Taxman do this? –the answer is that we have already paid him income tax on what he has classed as charitable giving. This rebate is a big help to our Church's finances, and in 2019 we were able to reclaim £5,042 from Taxman.

Anyone who is a U.K taxpayer can use the scheme, and I would urge anyone who hasn't done so, to use G/A to make their offerings. Please contact me---my details are in the front of the magazine. The G/A scheme is confidential, and offerings can be made using envelopes, or by standing order via the person's bank, or by "one off" donations by cheque.

Of course, not everyone is a taxpayer, and Taxman has not ignored those of us who donate but are non taxpayers. In a fit of generosity a few years ago, Taxman introduced a scheme called "The Gift Aid Small Donation Scheme" (GASDS). This scheme enables EACH of our churches to claim a 25% rebate on "open plate" type giving up to a maximum of £8,000 contributed. In the last financial year, Taxman gave back a total of £1,792 for our open plate giving. The GASDS scheme however, should not be seen as an alternative to the G/A scheme, which has no cap on what can be reclaimed.

Many thanks then, to those who make their offerings using G/A, and to those non taxpayers whose offerings support the GASDS. And so, the next time we have a moan about our income tax, remember that there is a generous side to Taxman too ---so let us all take advantage of his generosity.

Rothes Council Path Steering Group

Rothes - Craigellachie Path

As you are probably aware our aim is to provide a safe link for walker, cyclists and wheelers between the two communities and give improved access to the Speyside path network.

Following completion of the feasibility study last year (copies of which can be viewed at the Cottage Visitor Centre in Rothes), the Rothes Council Path Steering Group, with the ongoing support of local businesses have been able to secure further funding from Sustrans to enable us to move on to the next stage of the project.

This next stage will aim to develop the design and structure of the path, and to ensure the general approval and inclusion of all local land owners who may be affected by the project. Additionally we shall seek the views of the local community and endeavour to establish the level of support for the project.

It is our intention to ensure that all land owners are consulted and in this respect if you have any concerns in respect of the proposed development please do not hesitate to contact me directly, as below, or through the Rothes Council.

Although closed to the public until Easter, The Speyside Visitor Centre and Old Station Tearoom are beginning to prepare for next season.

There is a plan to fit paylocks to the Public Toilets at the Visitor Centre building, which will allow use of the facilities on a 24 hour basis as well as raise income for the Community Association.

The heritage resources in the Visitor Centre are being collated and there are discussions taking place with regard to exhibitions planned for this year.

One display that is confirmed is a look at the history of Speyside whisky making. This event will run for a week during the Speyside Whisky festival. The Visitor Centre and tearoom will feature photographs by Bill Morgan who is organising the display. During the festival we will be showing videos relating to the history of whisky production in this area and Bill will be presenting talks on the subject.

1980-2020 Another project in the very early stages of discussion is a proposal to organise a village event to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the opening of the Old Station Tearoom, and to acknowledge the tremendous work done by the many volunteers who have worked there over the years. Details of this project will be circulated once they are agreed and finalised.

The Community Asset Transfer bid for ownership of the Alice Littler Park submitted by The Comm. Assoc. was to have been discussed and voted upon at a Moray Council Policy and Resources Committee meeting on the 19th January. However the submission of a CAT bid for the Park by another Community Group on the 13th, just a few days before that meeting was to be held, means that a decision on future ownership of the Park, Car Park and Playground will now be delayed until much later this year.

There will be a recruitment drive held soon for volunteers to work at the Visitor Centre and Tearoom this summer.
