

Hello from the Manse!

I write this having just passed a significant milestone: it has now been exactly one year since I started ministry here in Aberlour. I don't know how you feel about the last year, but in one respect at least I'm incredibly grateful: it is very good to be here, and it has been very good to meet and begin to get to know folks. It's not been a straightforward year to settle into a new place and community and I'm so thankful for the kindness, patience, and openness we've found. I know there are plenty of folk still to meet and get to know, and I look forward to that as time goes on.

Having grown up and lived in cities until I moved here, one of the things I love about here is that when it gets dark, it is properly dark. The week I'm writing this there have been some big displays of the Aurora on show, and when we're not lucky enough to see the Northern lights I'm struck still by the stars that can be seen when there's not a whole city-worth of light pollution to hide them. While I love those aspects of the dark, this time of year can be challenging too. It can be all too easy to wake while it's dark and go through the whole day seeing very little natural light.

These can be difficult months to weather, and as well as the physical lack of light the symbol of 'darkness' can stand for all the difficulties, pains, and struggles we can find ourselves carrying through life. This winter many people are exhausted and weary, tired of living in ways that once seemed so strange, and still carrying all manner of frustrations, disappointments, griefs from the last 18 months of Covid-time. My sense is that many of us feel very 'heavy,' and are often now so used to it that we sometimes don't even notice. Where once we felt determined to 'get through it' and kept on going for promise of a 'return to normal,' most are now weary and running on low reserves.

At times like this it isn't helpful for preachers like me to attempt to offer trite words of so-called hope and enthusiasm. It also doesn't do to try to gee folks along with a 'cheer up!' or even a 'Keep calm and carry on!' It's easy for well-meaning words to fall flat.

However, it can also be easy, when we feel tired and weary, to miss or fail to recognise the things that *are* good and encouraging and glimmers of hope. I know I'm not as good as I could be at stopping and being reminded of the things I have to be thankful for. I'm not always as aware as I should be of the goodness, kindness and love in people around me. Because the fact is, in all the darkness of life, in the weariness and struggle there are people around us who are very real and very precious presences of light.

For Christians this speak of light amidst the darkness calls to mind a much-loved verse about Jesus in the Gospel of John. It's a verse often read at Christmas time, from a passage where the gospel-writer is attempting to make sense of *who* Jesus is, and the significance of saying that in Christ it is God who has been born in human form. 'In him was life, and that life was the light of all peoples. The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it.'

When I do manage to stop and notice the kindness, good, love and light in people, I don't find it difficult to describe those people as doing anything less than conveying the presence and love of God in a world of darkness, whether they know it or not. I am certain that you, reading this, can be (and surely already are) a very real presence of light in the life of someone. When you do live out love out in the world it is a truly important thing, perhaps *the most* important thing. To my mind it is nothing less than the work of heaven.

So we go on. We will see another winter, and we will know its darkness. But we'll maybe see also the stars or aurora, fireworks or lanterns, and we might manage to grasp onto the light in the darkness.

May you know strength and peace this winter time. May you know light amidst the darkness. And may you show light and love to others. God bless you.

Aberlour Parish Church Walking Group Winter Walks

Welcome to our 2021/22 Winter walks! Aberlour Parish Church Walking Group is a friendly group, open to all. Children are welcome, and so are dogs, under adult supervision. Please bring packed lunch for these walks and wear walking boots or strong shoes. Come ready to start the walks at 11am. If you need more information or help with transport please contact Jimmy (881707) or Donald (07909 936724). While any Covid restrictions are in place, please contact Donald in the week leading up to the walk to confirm you are coming.

<u>Sat 11th December 2021: Dufftown – Giant's Chair and Meg's Widd (8km / 5m)</u>

Meet at Dufftown Square / top of Balvenie Street. Both long and short walks go from Dufftown Square by the pleasant riverside path to the Giant's Chair on the Dullan Burn, and then back to Mortlach Kirk. The short walk (5km) goes directly back to the Square by road, while the long walk returns by Meg's Widd. Christmas lunch (well, soup and sandwiches) has been arranged at the Commercial Hotel in Dufftown. Please confirm by 28th November if you wish to join us for lunch to allow us to confirm numbers with the Hotel.

Sat 8th January 2022: Aberlour circular via Macallan (5km / 3m)

Meet at the Victoria Bridge car park. We will loop via Macallan and back to the car park

Sat 12th February 2022: Spey Bay, Garmouth, Kingston Circular (10km / 6m). Park at the Spey Bay Visitor Centre, north of Fochabers. The walk follows the Speyside Way south, crossing the Spey Viaduct to Garmouth. We will walk by the coast to Kingston, and then back to Garmouth via the Water Tower, and return over the viaduct to Spey Bay.

Sat 12th March 2022: Quarrel Wood Circular (8.5km / 5.0m)

Park in the "Woodland Park" (Leggat Car Park) just off the A96 (3km / 2m) west of Elgin. This is a circular woodland walk, which will take you through forest and sandstone quarries, giving great views to the north to the area occupied by the medieval Spynie Loch. The path has some rough sections in places. There are opportunities to provide Shorter Walks.

The Rothes Way

2021 Is definitely an important year for the Rothes Way. G & A Construction, part of The Forsyth Group, built the first mile of the path free of charge. The many who use the path all agree that it is wonderful to be able to walk up as far as the Bulwark on such a fantastic path. The trustees are very grateful to the Forsyth Group for not only building the path but for kick starting our project and giving us credibility with the various other funding bodies.



Also a thank you to Ian Jenkins, Keith Kingham and Ronnie Stuart for the benches on the route, which are being well used. I am sure you have noticed some bird feeders and boxes have appeared? This is thanks to our resident wildlife lover, Hugh Cameron.

We have now secured funding for the second section of the path and work is already underway. We were awarded £25k from The Berry Burn Community Fund, £10k each from the Rothes Windfarm, the Gordon & Ena Baxter Foundation, the Adam Family Foundation and the National Lottery Community Fund. We have also received £1k from the Rothes Council, £1.5k from Speyburn Distillery, £3k from Diageo and £1k from Tamdhu Distillery. Local residents and anonymous donors have given £815 in total. The total amount raised, including the £60k cost of the first section built by G & A Construction, comes to just over £141k. A truly amazing amount in such a small space of time.

The Fundraising group organised a whisky auction at the beginning of the year and a total of £7k was raised. A big thank you to individuals and businesses who donated bottles and bid on the auction. Speyside Whisky Auctions hosted the auction and took no fees from the group. We have a pop up charity shop being held in the Rothes Social Club Hall 10th - 14th November and we will update everyone on that through our Facebook page and our website www.rothesway.com.

Our next plan is to start getting things in place for the final section, which will be the most expensive part of the path.(Approx. £150k-£200k). Once we get plans drawn up, and submitted to Moray Council, we will put the final section out to tender. Then we start the fundraising again! However, having two thirds of the path completed, will hopefully put us in good stead for securing the funds required to complete the path.

Finally, we have a small maintenance team looking after the path which consists of mainly cutting back the growth. However, with the second section due to be completed this year, next year we will have twice as much to maintain. HERITAGE TRAIL

I have recently been in discussion with church representatives in the Aberlour / Craigellachie area with regard to the possibility of establishing a Heritage trail in Charlestown of Aberlour as a community project to celebrate 2022 that has been designated Scotland's Year of Stories by Heritage Scotland The building of the church in Craigellachie should be included in the overall project as it was established through funding from Margaret Mcpherson Grant one of the benefactors to be highlighted on the trail. Outline details of the project are included below. It is aimed to establish the trail by summer 2022.

Proposal:

To design and develop a self - guided Heritage Trail around Aberlour to raise awareness of the 19th century benefactors who developed the physical and social structure of the town created by Charles Grant of Wester Elchies in 1812. The Trail will be marked by way of wall mounted or freestanding plaques.

A map and QR codes will provide the background information to illustrate the trail.

Purpose:

To develop activity to help school children and local residents learn about their town's history and offer an activity to encourage visitors to spend more time in town and boost trade for local businesses.

As we come to the end of yet another year, we can certainly say it's been a busy one for the Car Share! Journey numbers in the last year are 300% up on the previous one, which is understandable considering we were in lockdown for most of it. However, we have made 50% more journeys in comparison to 2019, which was before Covid changed all of our lives. This means we've been able to help even more members than before make essential journeys that the more able bodied of us take for granted. We are pleased to say that we have taken members to their vaccine appointments, as well as to other medically related appointments, and been able to resume trips to the shops, hairdressers, various clubs and also for social visits. If you live in the Speyside Glenlivet area and have difficulty getting about due to age, disability or infirmity we may be able to help you too. To get information on eligibility to join please email admin@speysideccss.co.uk, visit our Facebook page or website at www.speysideccss.co.uk, or call 01340 831748 during our opening hours of Monday to Friday 9am to 5pm. I will be happy to go through things with you or with someone else on your behalf.

We currently have 22 volunteer drivers and 5 volunteer telephonists who all give up their time so willingly to help our members, and we are very fortunate that nine of our volunteer drivers live in the Craigellachie & Aberlour area. We've always room for one more though since it is more cost effective and time saving if we can use a driver as close as possible to our member. So, if you have your own vehicle, enjoy driving and have some free time, please think about helping people in your local community - even if it is in the short term or on the odd occasion. Your fuel costs will be covered by the Scheme and there is absolutely no regular commitment. The runs could be local or to Aberdeen or Inverness, but it's always your choice whether you accept the journey or not. I would be happy to attend any meetings of local groups or organisations to let them know more about joining the Scheme or volunteering with us. If you know of any who would be interested in having some more information or would like a poster and leaflets sent to them, please get in touch with me using the contact details above.

As always, we are so grateful to all of our volunteers, both telephonists and drivers, who have helped members with their journeys this last year and to the businesses, groups and individuals in the local community and beyond who have supported us financially. It is only with this help that we can keep the wheels turning and look forward to being able to help even more members next year.

The Village Hall extension is nearing completion and we are looking forward to the improved access and facilities, which will make visiting the village hall easier for those with mobility problems. Down at the Highlander Playpark, next to the tennis courts, the timber retaining the wood chips at the base of the children's play equipment had deteriorated and we are very grateful to the willing volunteers who made the necessary repairs.

As part of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations, community picnics or "Big Lunches" are planned across the UK. Craigellachie Village Council has agreed to arrange a picnic/Big Lunch for 5 June 2022 and details will be publicised in the spring.

There was a good attendance at the AGM and, although we were unable to appoint a new Chairperson, we are delighted to welcome Mike & Janice as joint Vice Chairpersons and several new committee members.

As life once again begins to become a bit more normal, we have scheduled our popular Fundraising Whisky Auction for Sunday 1 May 2022. Look out for details in early 2022.



Users of the Craigellachie 100 steps will have noticed that the steps have moved from the stone wall and people are advised to take extra care when using the steps. Keeping to the handrail side of the steps as much as possible is safest as the loose mortar on the wall side is unstable and might cause an accident. Unfortunately, someone recently fell and sustained nasty cuts to their head and leg after stepping onto a spot where the cement had crumbled. We have been trying to ascertain who is responsible for the steps but this is proving to be very difficult. The alternative routes via Edward Avenue (Dufftown Road) involves using the narrow pavement and close proximity to high volume of traffic, including HGV lorries, while the majority of the route via Spey Road has no footpath and pedestrians have to walk on the roadway. Given the lack of a safe pavement/footpath between the "high and lower" village, the 100 steps are vital to the village and we will continue to lobby and try to find a solution to the problem.
