

Pastoral Letter February 2022

Hello from the manse!

...so still it goes on! I don't know that two years ago any of us realistically feared that Covid-19 would still be having the sort of impact on our day-to-day lives that it continues to have. For many of us the burden of it weighs just as heavily as it ever has, and yet it has been so long and habitual that we might not even notice the extra 'weight' that we carry around each day. Many are tired, at or past burnout point; looking forward only reveals that plans remain difficult to make, always speculative and conditional upon things being better; and while in many spheres of life an increasing degree of normality appears to be returning, there's nothing normal about the exhaustion with which we enter the next chapter. We want to enter a world experiencing a level of 'normality', yet everything has changed hugely in the last two years – nothing is normal anymore, and the pressures faced by many are mounting.

With that picture of the world around us, it would be only natural to have a fairly bleak outlook on life. It has been that way for so long that frustration with the situation can be very high – to say that we're 'fed up' with the consequences of the pandemic is likely a huge understatement for many of us. Resentment is high – of course it is – because of the two painful years we have lived through. When we carry frustration and resentment, we often look for someone to blame: someone or something that is at 'fault' and if it weren't for them then everything would've been just fine all along. Now sometimes things go wrong and there is an identifiable person who really is responsible, and they can and should carry responsibility for what happened. Other times, the thing that has gone 'wrong' isn't really about fault and blame: but we still have the frustration and resentment that we want to take out, to vent our pent-up emotions. In those cases, it can be tempting to go looking for a target to blame, no matter how little that target had to do with the situation: we find a scapegoat.

The tendency to look for a target on which to project all the negative things we feel was well understood by ancient peoples. The term scapegoat has its origin in an ancient Israelite practice described in the bible. Two male goats would be presented before the priests with lots drawn to designate one of them as the 'scapegoat'. The scapegoat would then be chased out from the village into the wilderness, symbolically carrying the sin and shame of the community out to the wild, never to return. While it sounds a very strange practice today, we can probably still understand the psychology of what was happening: by projecting all the sin and shame and negativity of a situation onto the (helpless and innocent) scapegoat, the people had a vent for potentially destructive emotions. Placing it all on the scapegoat was designed to prevent people venting the re-

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sentment and frustration on each other – creating arguments, rifts, and destruction to the fabric of the community.

Of course scapegoating still happens today. though more often it is a much more cynical manoeuvre by those in leadership or power to preserve their own status by identifying someone to 'take the fall' for something which wasn't truly their fault. It is not a healthy way of dealing with things, and is done by those who lack integrity, shirk responsibility, and fail to see the intrinsic human worth of those they scapegoat. Scapegoating is a poor way to deal with a negative situation, and not a mature way to process emotions of frustration and resentment. We have to be careful in times like these how we process our difficult emotions. On the one hand, locking up our frustrations and pretending they are not there is likely only to be harmful to ourselves in the end; on the other, it is not an acceptable option to vent our resentments in misdirected ways on those who bear no responsibility. Even where there are genuine grievances, we must always act with empathy, recognising the human worth of the person before us, whatever our emotions towards them might be. Living well with our negative emotions is difficult work. It is even harder when we are living through a time of exhaustion. To my mind, a significant step is simply naming our emotions, allowing ourselves to feel them, and being aware of the difficulty they pose us.

For those with faith, that is also part of the work of prayer: approaching the God who accepts us as we are (not as we think we should be, but simply how we really are in that moment) and naming before God in prayer the difficulties and struggles we carry. Prayer is not always seeking answers, or asking God for things. Sometimes prayer is simply being conscious of our presence with and before God – and doing so in a way that to the outsider looks simply like holding one's peace. There's a story about Mother Theresa that sums up something of this form of prayer: an interviewer asked her, "When you pray, what do you say to God?" Mother Teresa replied, "I don't talk, I simply listen." Believing he understood what she had just said, the interviewer next asked, "Ah, then what is it that God says to you when you pray?" Mother Teresa replied, "God also doesn't talk. God also simply listens."

I know not everyone who reads this will be the praying type, but if prayer represents a way of unburdening ourselves on something 'bigger' than ourselves; rather than venting misdirected frustration and resentment on scapegoats then it seems to me a well-directed use of otherwise difficult-to-handle emotional energy. God is big enough to take it.

I hope this finds you keeping safe and keeping well. Wishing God's blessing with you and yours.


Members all enjoyed a lovely Christmas Lunch in December at the Aberlour Hotel. It was so nice to be able to spend some quality time together after so long.

Aberlour Parish Church Walking Group

Welcome to our 2022 Spring walks! Aberlour Parish Church Walking Group is a friendly group, open to all. Children are welcome, as are dogs (under adult supervision). Please bring packed lunch for these walks and wear walking boots or strong shoes. Come ready to start the walks at 11am. If you need more information or help with transport please contact Jimmy (881707) or Donald (07909 936724). While any Covid restrictions are in place, please contact Donald in the week leading up to the walk to confirm you are coming.

Sat 12th March 2022: Quarrel Wood Circular (8.5km / 5.0m)

Park in the "Woodland Park" (Leggat Car Park) just off the A96 (3km / 2m) west of Elgin. This is a circular woodland walk, which will take you through forest and sandstone quarries, giving great views to the north to the area occupied by the medieval Spynie Loch. The path has some rough sections in places. There are opportunities to provide Shorter Walks.

Sat 8th April 2022: Loch Vaa Circular (8.7km / 5m)

Meet at the Boat of Garten Community Hall (Football Pitch). The circular route is mostly on forest tracks, looping on an undulating path round Loch Vaa. After a lunch break we will return on forest tracks, and along Kinchurdy Road and Deshar Road to Boat of Garten to the Community Hall. This is a relatively flat walk, with a network of paths available for those who want a short detour to explore the forest.

Sat 14th May 2022: Christian Aid Sponsored Walk

Look out for details nearer the time. This is likely to be in the Rothes / Craigellachie /Dufftown / Aberlour area

Sat 11th June 2022: Bin of Cullen (7km / 4.5m) (with option for 15km / 9m to be explored).

From limited roadside parking at NJ 492 633, the walk is on good quality forest tracks through the Badentarget Plantation, approaching the summit from the South. The tracks go steadily up hill, rising 210m to the summit (320m) which is above the tree cover and provides excellent views across the Moray Firth. The return retraces the route. A longer 15km route may be provided as an additional option with a circular route starting and finishing at the car park at Old Cullen.

The Rothes Way

Since our last update, we have held our 5 day pop up charity shop, which was a huge success, raising over £5,700. It was really hard work, before, during and after the event but it was really good fun. We cannot thank everyone enough for coming along and supporting our fund-raising effort for the path. Many thanks to those who donated goods and the many volunteers who helped man the shop. We are also very fortunate that The Robertson Trust has generously offered to partial-match fund the sum raised.

Unfortunately, as I am sure many of you will be aware, we have had a setback with the second section of the path. Mr Robertson, owner of Dandaleith Farm, who had previously been fully supportive of the path, has now expressed concerns regarding his privacy and halted construction in October, when around 2/3rds of the upgrading work had been completed. We were really disappointed with this action, as we were on schedule to have the first 2 miles of the path completed before the end of the year.

However, as the saying goes, "Nothing good in life comes easy". We are trying to arrange a meeting with Mr Robertson in order to address his concerns and attempt to reach an agreement with him. There is no denying that it is a major setback, but after over 3 decades trying to get this project off the ground, we look on it as a blip on the road or, in our case, path!

We also want to take this opportunity to clarify a point over ownership of Dandaleith. Mr Robertson's Edinburgh-based company, Springfield Properties (Scotland) Limited owns the ground. This is a completely different company from the local house builders Springfield Properties in Elgin, who have been very supportive and generously donated £10,000 for the Rothes Way through the Adam Family Trust.

Finally, our maintenance team has been out again, clearing up after storm Arwen. A huge thank you to them for giving up their time. So far we have been using our own garden tools but we have been successful in obtaining a grant of almost £2,000 from Paths for All, which will enable us to purchase tools and equipment needed for keeping the path tidy and in good repair. Also, we are really pleased to say that Ronnie Stuart has taken on the role of main contact for the maintenance of the path. His mobile number is 07801 365216.

As we move through another year, we look forward to being able to continue helping our members make those essential journeys the more able of us take for granted. We are pleased to say that last year we took our members on trips to the shops, hairdressers, various clubs and also on social visits as well as to their medically related appointments including vaccination clinics. In 2021 our volunteer telephonists booked 1372 journeys with our volunteer drivers covering an amazing 22,636 miles which meant our members were able to have trips out and get to their appointments both locally and in Aberdeen. So, if you live in the Speyside Glenlivet area and have difficulty getting about due to age, disability or infirmity please get in touch as we may be able to help you too. We are happy to have recently welcomed David who joins us as volunteer driver working within our team of 23 volunteer drivers and 5 volunteer telephonists. We are very fortunate to have so many people willing to give some of their time to help those in their local community but there is always room for one more volunteer! Many of our members live in your area and it is more time saving and cost effective if we can use a driver as close as possible to our member. So, if you have your own vehicle, enjoy driving and meeting people and have some free time you're exactly who we're looking for! Even if it is in the short term or on the odd occasion for an hour or so it would be a huge help. You will be paid a mileage allowance towards your costs and there is absolutely no regular commitment. The runs could be local (which they mostly are) or to Aberdeen or Inverness but it's always your choice whether you accept the journey or not. I would be happy to attend any meetings of local groups or organisations to let them know more about joining the Scheme or volunteering with us.
