

Pastoral Letter April 2022

Hello from the Manse!

As I write this, it is still a fairly new situation that face coverings are no longer legally mandated for places of worship, and very soon they will not be legally required in shops either. I hesitate to predict what the situation will be by the time this edition of Kirk News actually goes out (there have been so many new hurdles along the way) but the hope is that we are now moving into a longer season of a quieter time in the pandemic that has changed the world. Of course, some will still want to keep wearing face coverings, and the situation is certainly not as straightforward as returning to a normal that we had in the now nostalgic 'before'. We all, in our own way, continue to have a duty to be responsible and look out for each other: the long-term effects will be with us for some time to come. Devi Sridar, professor of Global Health at the University of Edinburgh, recently suggested that going forward we will have to be deeply mindful of the long-term effects of Covid. She has named in particular: the effect that Covid has had on income and security of work and income; the need for research into long-covid and supporting those whose lives have been turned upside-down by the lottery of the impact of the virus; the ongoing effect of living through a pandemic on children and young people; taking seriously the effects on mental health across the population of having lived through the last two years.

I am obviously not a health professional, and I'm not beginning this letter with the subject of Covid-19 to provide yet another amateurish 'hot-take' on the subject that we're all completely exhausted by. What I am interested in, is the question of how we transition from what has been a long time of upheaval, stress, adaptation, and coping-more-than-flourishing. One way of looking at that transition is to borrow from the theme we're using locally this year for Christian Aid week: 'building bridges'. While the work of Christian Aid has always been about building bridges, particularly globally between those with plenty and those in the world with least (more on Christian Aid later in this edition!), there is also a sense in which we're in a season of bridge building, from the 'before' to the 'next'. We each have a part to play in determining what that future might look like, and to contribute to the building of it.

I am no structural engineer, though it seems obvious to me that there are two very basic facts about bridges. The first is that bridges exist to get from point A to point B, over a particular obstacle, in a way that prevents the need for a long alternative route. In a metaphorical sense, the bridge-building towards the future will be getting from point A of Covid-times - with its reduction in what has been

possible and permissible, as well as the many tolls it has taken on all of us individually and collectively – to arrive at point B, a future which we have a part in dreaming out together, and working towards collectively. This future will be a new thing, cherishing what has been good about the past but also recognising that we are all changed and that returning to exactly what was 'before' won't be possible.

The second thing about bridges is that the type of bridge, and the methods of construction will be highly dependent on the unique features of the site: what has worked in one place won't be appropriate for another, and sometimes the situation requires new, creative and innovative ways of overcoming the obstacle. One of the things that makes our beloved Telford Bridge at Craigellachie so significant in the history of engineering is the innovation it took to build into the sheer rockface on the North side. With space tight and the need for a single span to protect against potential high water levels, traditional masonry arches wouldn't work: a creative solution was needed. In a pioneering move that laid the foundation for so many other iconic structures, Telford turned to cast iron to give us the iconic structure that endures today. For us too, one end of the 'bridge' lies in tricky terrain, we all feel how hard the last two years have been. Finding a route towards growth and flourishing out of these experiences will be much more than simply reverting back to what once was – it will require creative ways of re-learning how to be, as individuals and as communities.

With this 'bridge' between now and our future we don't have a choice on whether or not to go: time will pass either way, the future will come. We do have a choice on how we want to shape it and build it. In particular we have a choice about how we will be and act as we go forward, and what values we will cherish when we do.

In church last Sunday (which will be some time ago by the time you read this) we reflected upon some of the final words Jesus had for his disciples before his arrest and crucifixion: 'I give you a new commandment: love one another.' I hope that whatever the future holds, whatever the 'bridge' between now and the future comes to look like, it will be founded and shaped by a collective desire to live out love for our neighbour. All the other values we might want for our community are, I think, founded in and grow out of love.

Aberlour Parish Church Walking Group Summer Walks

Welcome to our 2022 Summer walks! Aberlour Parish Church Walking Group is a friendly group, open to all. Children are welcome, as are dogs (under adult supervision). Please bring packed lunch for these walks and wear walking boots or strong shoes. Come ready to start the walks at 11am. If you need more information or help with transport please contact Jimmy (881707) or Donald (07909 936724). Please contact Donald in the week leading up to the walk to confirm that you are coming.

Sat 14th May 2022: Christian Aid Sponsored Walk (19km / 12km)

The annual Christian Aid Sponsored Walk starts from Dufftown (Speyside Way Car Park), with lunch at the Craigellachie Telford Bridge, Tea at Aberlour Church, and a final loop taking in Glenallachie and the Linn Falls, finishing back at Aberlour Church at 14:30. Walk the sections you wish. Sponsor Form and envelopes are available from Donald (07909 936724) and in the participating Churches.

Sat 11th June 2022: Bin of Cullen (7km / 4.5m) (with option for 15km / 9m to be explored).

From limited roadside parking at NJ 492 633, the walk is on good quality forest tracks through the Badentarget Plantation, approaching the summit from the South. The tracks go steadily up hill, rising 210m to the summit (320m) which is above the tree cover and provides excellent views across the Moray Firth. The return retraces the route. A longer 15km route may be provided as an additional option with a circular route starting and finishing at the car park at Old Cullen.

Sat 9th July 2022: Glacks of Balloch to Bridgehaugh (via Glenfiddich Lodge) (9.2km / 5.7m)

The route starts from the entrance to the Dornell Wind Farm site at the Glacks of Balloch (NJ 340 358) (just South of Dufftown) and follows good forest tracks through the forest around Carn Chrom to the ruined Glenfiddich Lodge, following the River Fiddich back to Bridgehaugh (Nj 352 342). Cars will be parked at both ends to allow for transport 2.5km along the Cabrach Road back to the start.

Sat 13th August 2022: Cullen - Portknockie Circular (via Fiddle Bow Rock) (8km / 5m)

A popular walk (especially in the sun). Meet in the Square in Cullen (NJ 513 671). We will walk across the viaduct from Cullen and proceed above Cullen

Bay to Portknockie. We will pass Bow Fiddle Rock, take steps down to beach, and follow the beach back to Cullen. A lovely walk especially in good weather!

Sat 10th September 2022: Darnaway Forest (Conicavel Circular (8.4km / 5.3m)

A new one! We meet beside the Conicavel Sawmill (NH 995 532) and walk through the Darnaway Estate, with stunning views over the River Findhorn below. We loop North close to the Castle, before returning through the beech forest, and commercial forest to Conicavel. Mostly forest tracks, but with paths in places.

The Stamp Appeal 2022-Collect Stamps to support Pastors in Lebanon The National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon {NESSL}

NESSL, is a partner of The Church Of Scotland, and has churches in both, Lebanon and Syria

The Synod of Syria and Lebanon employs more than a thousand including their pastors. The economic crisis in the country and the consequences of the huge explosion in Beirut, has hit hard, leaving the Synod struggling to pay salaries for pastors, which range from £100 to £150 a month. Pastors are struggling to make ends meet, others have left their vocation to seek other jobs as they are unable to feed their families.

Despite the hardships, experienced Pastors are reaching out to the needy in their congregations in a sacrificial way. This has prompted the National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon to reach out, to their partners around the world, for support in their ongoing projects, including the support of Pastors

This year the stamp project proceeds aim to raise enough funds to support a Pastor for a full year.

There are collection boxes in both Aberlour and Craigellachie churches for your used stamps. As the traditional Royal Mail stamps are now being replaced by barcoded ones, I suggest you cut around the stamp, including the barcode, leaving 1 to 2cm margins. At this time I do not know if the barcoded stamps will be of any value to The World Mission Appeal going forward.

As we move so quickly through another year, we are pleased that we are able to continue helping our members make those essential journeys the more able of us take for granted. Last year we took our members on trips to the shops, hairdressers, various clubs, social visits as well as to their medically related appointments which included vaccination clinics.

In 2021 our volunteer telephonists booked 1372 journeys with our volunteer drivers covering an amazing 24,884 miles, which meant our members were able to have trips out and get to their appointments both locally and in Aberdeen.
