

<u>Pastoral Letter</u> February 2023

Friends,

As I write this letter for the Spring issue of the Kirk News it is *only just* beginning to show signs of the season. Only two days ago I saw my first snowdrop of 2023, and yesterday the little yellow bloom of aconite under the manse sycamore tree began opening up. Hopefully by the time you read this all manner of bright flowers will be out – bursts of daffodils, smatterings of crocuses, hyacinths and tulips adding to a chorus of colour.

After a long winter these signs of warmth and light to come are like a sigh of relief. It is often easy to forget that, despite our relatively mild climate, we are further north (and therefore get less winter light) than places like Moscow, Calgary, even parts of Alaska! In fact, we are further north in Aberlour than the southernmost tip of Chile is south. That the change in light levels is so noticeable is just one of the factors that ground us in the natural rhythms of the seasons. There is wisdom in leaning into these rhythms, for as much as the advancements of technology and the availability of foodstuffs from around the globe allow us a sense of transcending seasonality, we are humans who have been created and evolved to the rhythms of the seasons.

Of course, it is not just that we are shaped by the seasons. We have also shaped the seasons: and not for the better. With each year, nature's waypoint markers of the year seem thrown off more and more; bulbs spring earlier; weather patterns are more erratic. These signs of the uncomfortable truth that human 'progress' has harmed our planet demand our action: we are told that there is already damage irreparable, but that we might yet salvage some form of sustainability. Some of the opening verses of the bible describe God creating the world and God looking at creation and calling it 'good' – perhaps we need to learn again just how good the earth we've been trusted with truly is.

So as Spring begins to take shape, a season of growth and newness, even hope: what are the things you look forward to of growth in the time to come? What sustains your hope?

I'm aware that for many there are all manner of difficulties being faced, and to talk of hope can sound shallow. While we are coming to the end of winter, the financial challenges of increased cost of living and especially heating have bitten hard, and in ways that will have lasting impact. Through three rounds of funding from the Corra Foundation over the last year, Aberlour Parish Church, with the help of local schools, has been able to administer over £10k in small hardships grants to families who need it most. But these still amount to gestures which are at best sticking-plaster help to those experiencing the sharp edge of an economy which has something more fundamentally disordered going on. We can but hope for better, and for those who struggle to hope, we can all in our words and actions attempt to be signs of hope in our community and our world.

I suppose that is the strength I see in our community, and the potential for hope and solidarity that living in a place where genuine community is still a possibility (in ways that more urban settings struggle with). Building community is a practise of accumulating little acts of hope, and growing resilience, and reaching out to each other for the flourishing of the whole. And that is work for all seasons – from the first bright snowdrop of spring to sustain us through downpour and gale.

Accessibility Support

GLEBE PROJECT

The Aberlour Parish Church is committed to promoting community engagement and helping to promote and improve wellbeing for those living or staying in Aberlour and the surrounding area. As part of this, the church, in consultation with the community, is developing a community garden in the green area known as the Glebe.

The Glebe Garden project seeks the flourishing of every person, irrespective of faith, and the flowering of our local environment. The project will seek to celebrate and promote the natural richness and potential of the site at the Glebe, and to do so in ways that enable the wellbeing of individuals and promotes strong and supportive relationships.

Two community consultations have taken place, one in June 2022 and the second in November 2022. Both events produced a rich tapestry of information which has helped to steer and shape the project.

Although the layout of the Glebe Garden is still to be refined, it is now taking shape, taking on the important points raised in the consultation events. Some of the key areas in the garden will be:



Growing areas for vegetables Mud kitchen/children's areas Quiet area for reflection and contemplation Walkways through wildflower and orchard areas A polytunnel and shed

The Glebe steering group are currently looking at costs for all of the above, plus the costs of utilities (water and electricity), as well as contacting potential suppliers so that orders can be lodged.

The project is very much reliant on the support of the community. All offers of help are very much appreciated; whether you are an experienced gardener, or just have an interest. We would love you to get involved, so please talk to Andrew the minister

Regarding future closure of the church building in Craigellachie

There's a hymn that I remember from Sunday school which includes the words:

The church is not a building, the church is not a steeple,

the church is not a resting place, the church is a people...

I am the church, you are the church, we are the church together

The profound truth of these words notwithstanding, for many people and in many communities Church buildings are cherished and valued. They are places of memories – both joyful and sad; they are places where people have gathered for generations; they are testaments in stone and mortar to the witness of communities in their worship of God.

You may be aware that the Church of Scotland is in the midst of going through a large national-scale exercise of planning how to best use the resources at its disposal for the future of the church. These include how best to deploy ministers and which buildings are deemed as essential going forward. It is no secret that the Church of Scotland is in a period of numerical and financial decline, even as the faith of its people is remarkably resilient and the heart for service, desire for action in Christian love to community and world is not dimmed. This process of planning for the future therefore will involve a very significant reduction in the number of ministers available to serve Scotland (a process which was happening naturally anyway through higher levels of retirement than recruitment) and also the most significant reduction in Church of Scotland buildings many will have ever seen. These are difficult decisions, and those taking them have not done so lightly nor without significant consideration.

I'll spare you the long and jargon-filled precise details of the processes and decisions which have been made, however among the headlines for our area is that the church building in Craigellachie is scheduled to cease being used as a place of worship for the Church of Scotland. At this moment a precise timeline is not possible to name, nor precisely what the future use of the building might be: these decisions will come in later stages, and in other examples across Scotland can involve interested community groups. While the regional and national bodies of the church have the right to dictate a timeline for closure, the local Kirk Session is considering proactively how to engage constructively with them to ensure the best way to transition well into the next stage, and have suggested that an appropriate timeline to aim for would see the building cease to be used for worship in May 2024. It is Kirk Session's desire not to painfully delay the inevitable for unhelpfully long, but also to give ample opportunity to celebrate and say goodbye to a building which has served the church and the community of Craigellachie well for over 150 years.

This news will be a sadness for some, even if the pragmatism of the step might also be recognised: it is good to be able to name that sadness, even as we determine to make the best of what the future brings. In the next while the Kirk Session are planning a series of events – some of which would have happened in 2020 to celebrate 150 years of the building, and also provide opportunity to mark what the building has meant to so many people over the years.

Finally to say that both I and the Kirk Session of Aberlour Parish Church are determined to make good on the truth of the hymn quoted above: that even without a building, the church will continue as a people of God, and will serve the community of Craigellachie and witness to the love of God in whatever ways might be possible. Spring 2023 Walks

Welcome to our 2023 Spring walks! Aberlour Parish Church Walking Group is a friendly group, open to all (members and non-members). Our aim is to combine walking with an opportunity to meet and chat with other walkers, and to introduce walkers to some new areas. Children are welcome, and so are dogs, under adult supervision. Please bring packed lunch for these walks and wear walking boots or strong shoes. Come ready to start the walks at 11am. If you need more information or help with transport please contact Donald (contact details below). Please contact Donald in the week leading up to the walk to confirm that you are coming, to help with planning.

Sat 11th March 2023: Cromdale to Easter Rynaballoch (Circular) (8km / 5m) Postponed from October 2022. We will park at the Cromdale football pitch car park (NJ 076 286) and walk along the Speyside Way to Easter Pollowick, before crossing the road and walking on the track to Easter Rynaballoch and then to Wester Rynaballoch, before returning through the forest, retracing our steps to Cromdale. We might provide some historical context around the "Haughs of Cromdale Battle".

Sat 8th April 2023: Roseisle Circular (7.5km / 4.5m & 13.2km / 8.2m)

Last visited in February 2019. We will park at the Roseisle Forest Car park (NJ 015 657), and walk on coastal forest tracks to Burghead, before returning to the car park via the old railway and forest tracks. For those who want a bit more, we will continue South to the edge of the Kinloss airfield, returning back to the main car park (an additional 6km). The optional longer route only has a 60m height rise, so this is flat, and on generally good tracks throughout.

Sat 13th May 2023: Christian Aid Walk

As in previous years, we will walk locally in the Spey valley - possibly 15km (9m) but with three distinct sections. Walk it all, or specific sections - your choice. However, the purpose of the walk is to support the work of Christian Aid, and sponsorship forms will be available.

This is under development, with a plan to link up several of the Churches on Speyside.

Sat 10th June 2023: Grantown to Nethybridge (9km / 5.5m).

We will park some cars at Nethybridge, and return to the Anagach Woods Car Park to start the walk. The walk follows the Speyside Way South, crossing the Spey on the pedestrian, General Roy bridge. It continues along the Speyside Way on the South Bank of the Spey past Balliefurth Wood to Nethybridge, before driving back to Anagach to pick up the cars. Another flat walk (78m rise) on good tracks

Traidcraft News

Traidcraft has sadly had to go into administration in spite of the best efforts of the management and staff to keep it viable. This has been the result of the pandemic, rising costs, and all the factors that have sadly brought an end to many businesses. Thirty jobs in Gateshead at the HQ have been lost, and many Fairtrade producers will lose this opportunity to sell their products.

Over the past 44 years Traidcraft has pioneered fair trade, introducing the wide variety of Fairtrade products we have become familiar with - tea, coffee, chocolate, sugar and many, many more. Traidcraft helped develop the Fairtrade Mark and bring Fairtrade into supermarkets and shops. It has made a significant impact. That legacy remains.

There is the possibility that some interested party will buy the business and efforts are under way in this direction. Meantime, there are other Fairtrade suppliers. Our own Fairtrade shop in Aberlour Church will continue in the meantime while we await developments and explore options. So please keep supporting our shop, and buying Fairtrade wherever and whenever you can.

SPEYSIDE COMMUNITY CAR SHARING SCHEME



The Car Share has got off to a flying start in 2023 and as we're about to go into our 20th year we're having our busiest spell ever!! Our membership has increased by over 80 new members in the last 10 months and we've seen a big increase in demand for our services. We are very lucky to have 22 volunteer drivers and 5 telephonists including your local drivers Alexander and Beth from Craigellachie and Helen, Mary, Nancy, Peter, Robbie, Steve and Terry who live in the Aberlour area. We also have a committee of 7, chaired by Irene, who do a great job of overseeing things and making sure the Car Share operates as efficiently as possible. These volunteers give up their time so willingly to make sure our members throughout Speyside and Glenlivet can make their journeys safely and we are very grateful to them all, however, we urgently need new volunteers - even if it is in the short term or on the odd occasion for an hour or so.

Our drivers are paid a mileage allowance towards their running costs for the total miles they cover, therefore it is more cost effective and time saving if we can use a driver as close as possible to our member. If you live in the Speyside & Glenlivet area, have your own vehicle, enjoy driving and meeting people and have some free time, please think about helping us out. The runs could be local (which they mostly are) or to Aberdeen or Inverness, but it's always your choice whether you accept the journey or not; there is absolutely no regular commitment, just a willingness to step in when needed and when you're free to help out.

Also, we're fortunate to have a full team of volunteer telephonists at the moment, but it would be helpful for us to have someone willing to fill in to cover holidays and sickness. You don't need any specialised equipment as I simply transfer the calls to your phone when you're taking the calls and full training and support is given. So, if you are keen to give something back to your local community, please contact me on 01340 831748, Monday to Friday 9am to 5pm, and I will be happy to chat to you about what it involves.
