

Friends,

Last summer saw the fulfilment of a long-held ambition for me: I now keep bees!

I'm aware that among those who read this letter will be much more experienced and expert beekeepers, so I don't pretend to say anything about bees with anything more than novice enthusiasm, however I was deeply gladdened, when on a milder day last week, I finally saw them fly for the first time after the winter. Even for experienced keepers, I think seeing the bees after the winter comes as a relief. During the long dark months there is a temptation to want to look inside the hive 'just to check up on them', but that's only ever likely to do them harm: they simply need left to it.

The more I read about bees (and the more I experience them) the more fascinating they become. It seems they have much to teach humans, with lessons that if we lived them out might make the world a good deal better. From the way each bee has a role (and some change roles throughout their life) carried out for the harmony of the whole hive; to the highly co-operative way the hive's work is ordered (think of the bee who has found especially good nectar and pollen to forage 'dancing' to indicate to others where the riches can be found); and then there's the deeply intricate pattern of hexagonal waxcomb structure which has properties of insulation, airflow, and acoustics that we are still learning from and incorporating into cutting edge engineering in the human world!

But the honeybee fact I've been reflecting on recently is in some ways the most basic and straightforward one. What distinguishes the honeybee (of which there is only one species) from the many more species of bumbles, mason, and carder bees, is its ability to maintain a whole colony throughout the dark and cold of winter by storing up supplies: honey.

It's a strikingly simple and yet profound idea that in order to get through the tough and lean times it is vital to be able to draw on reserves from brighter and warmer seasons.

In the bible the book of psalms contains poetry and song lyrics from various figures that express the full range of human emotions and situations. Some are hymns of great thanksgiving, others are bitter cries of distress. One of the themes that is often found is something like the idea of drawing strength for tough times from knowledge that there were better things before, and promises of better to become. One of the best-known of these might be the line in the 23rd Psalm (The Lord's my Shepherd...) which goes: "Though I walk through the shadow of the valley of death, I will fear no evil; for You are with me and Your rod and staff comfort me." For the Psalm-writer, knowing they have felt close to God before fuels them through even the most difficult and challenging of times.

We all go through different seasons of life, some spells are like hard and bitter winters, others springs of new beginnings, sometimes the summer sun is beaming and all is well, and sometimes autumnal harvest for what has been previously sown. I wonder what sort of a season you are in just now? And if a tougher season, then what might be there for you to draw from for strength from prior reserves built up? Networks of cherished people? Happy memories? Simple life pleasures?

And if your season is a brighter one, is it worth thinking about what you can store up to cherish if ever you need to look back to draw strength from this good season?

May you know blessing and wholeness in every season of life. God bless you. *Andrew*

Aberlour Tennis Club - from Rusty Rackets to Andy Murrays, all are welcome!

As we wrap up against the cold and endure these windy, short, winter days, it's good to be reminded of this gem of an amenity situated in the heart of our vibrant village, and of it's friendly, welcoming ethos. Longer, brighter and warmer days lie ahead and the courts will soon be open again!

Tennis has been played in Aberlour since the end of the 1800s; historical documents show that by 1881, a tennis club of sorts was active on ground leased from Aberlour Orphanage - the wonderful black and white photo below from 1903 depicts a mixed



team on a match day against Buckie......amazing to think that play was possible despite the formal outfits! In the very early days, a croquet green doubled up as a surface for play, but in time three grass courts were established and in use, although, understandably, during the two world wars, they badly deteriorated through lack of care and fell into a state of disrepair.

Following WW2, the Club became active again and over the years improvements were made. Three courts became

two and in 1952 a red shale 'blaise' surface was laid, the courts were fenced and in 1971 a new wooden clubhouse was built with all the mod cons - electricity, running water and toilet facilities!

Matches were enthusiastically played against other local clubs in the 1940s and 50s and in the 1960s, Aberlour Tennis Club joined the Speyside Tennis League and participated in the North of Scotland LTA League with great success in mixed, ladies and junior doubles competitions from the 1960s right up to recent years.

The Covid pandemic of course halted play but allowed some reflection on the run-

down state of the wooden clubhouse building. Covid and Community Lottery grants were obtained and these, along with various generous local donations, provided funds for a rescue renovation project to update and transform the clubhouse into the fresh, comfortable and inviting structure it now is. It is the beating heart of the Club, where members meet, enjoy refreshments and entertain visiting teams, and it's new fresh look (incorporating Wimbledon colours) has enhanced the appeal of the area as a whole.



Today the Club has a small but enthusiastic group of members who do most of the not inconsiderable work needed to maintain the courts, grounds and the clubhouse. Each Spring, prior to the start of the tennis season, our Treasurer Marjory lovingly and singlehandedly prepares the two courts for action, painstakingly raking the surfaces into rows of neat piles, which she then carefully sieves and redistributes with a final rolling before the nets are put up ready for play. Truly a labour of love!

As a relative newcomer to Aberlour, I was encouraged to pick up my rusty racket and join the Club in the summer of 2022, and I am so glad I did! It has given me so much - a warm welcome from a lovely bunch of people, regular exercise in a beautiful and tranquil setting, wonderful new friendships, and the chance to improve my game with top quality coaching available. The courts are closed during the winter months, but many of the members have been enthusiastically keeping up their level of play with 'Pickleball' at Moray Sports Centre in Elgin and just recently at Speyside Community Centre Games Hall. 2024 has started well for the Club - a generous grant from Paul Hill Windfarms is allowing us to resurface the courts and update some of the fencing before the season starts this year; and we are even considering entering the Highland League again!

Tennis is a wonderful sport - it's good for mind, body and soul - and it requires relatively little outlaydecent shoes, a few tennis balls and a racket and you're away.

Aberlour Tennis Club provides the rest - somewhere to play and to socialise - we can even supply rackets and balls! Membership costs are affordable and allow access to Club Nights, weekly social play, coaching and competitions; but the courts are available to all, members and non-members alike, and they should be used. Visitors to the area and tourists are welcome and there is an honesty box for the court fees on a 'pay as you play' basis at very competitive pricing!



Aberlour Tennis Club is a valued asset to the village, providing quality leisure facilities accessible to all - all ages, all abilities. Aberlour Walking Group

Spring 2024 Walks

Welcome to our 2024 Spring walks. Aberlour Walking Group is a welcoming group, open to everybody in the community. Our aim is to combine walking with an opportunity to meet and chat with other walkers, and to introduce walkers to some new areas. Children are welcome, and so are dogs, under adult supervision. We usually stop for a quick tea/coffee enroute, so please bring a flask and wear walking boots or strong shoes. Come ready to start the walks at 9:30am. If you need more information or help with transport please contact Donald (contact details below). Please confirm with Donald that you are coming on any walk.

Sat 2nd March 2024: The Bin, Huntly (circular) (7.5km / 4.75m, 195m, ascent).

This is a circular route starting from the Forestry Car Park a few miles North West of Huntly on the A96. The walk on Forest paths and tracks encircles the Bin anticlockwise, before approaching the summit from the West providing excellent views to the East. We return South over Ord Hill to the car park.

<u>Sat 6th April 2024: Binn Hill from Kingston-on-Spey (circular)</u> (9.5km / 6m, 90m ascent).

This is a circular figure-of-eight route which starts from the car park at the mouth of the Spey in Kingston-on-Spey. It follows the Moray Coastal Trail and visits some of Moray's coastal defences from World War Two, including a rifle range. We follow a steep section on sandy paths climbing through woods to Binn Hill; stopping for a tea break to take in some excellent views of the coast. The route returns to the coast following the Moray Coastal trail back to the rifle range, returning to Kingston-on Spey on an inland track.

<u>Sat 4th May 2024: Buckie and Portgordon Gollachy circuit (9.0km / 5.5m, 90m ascent).</u>

This route is waymarked as the Gollachy Circular, connecting Buckie with its coastal neighbour, Portgordon. It starts from Cluny Square in Buckie and follows a coastal route on the Speyside Way to Portgordon, returning on an inland track round Buckpool Golf Course to Buckie.

25th May 2024: Allan Reid to Knochkan (circular) (12.5km / 7.75m, 170m ascent).

This one may be squelchy! We will park at the Allan Reid car park near Tomnavoulin and follow the River Livet to Knochkan bothy passing many ruined bothies. At Knochkan there is an option to walk up to Suie bothy. We return by a slightly different route over expansive moorland to the Blye water, returning on the east side of the Bochel to the car park. This is a fantastic walk (on a nice day) in the foothills of the Ladder Hills. (NOTE the different date, there is no June walk).

<u>Sat 6th July 2024: Portsoy and Sandend (circular) (9.0km / 5.5m, 130m, ascent).</u>

We return to the coast for a circular walk from Portsoy to Sandend. More details in the next Kirk News.

'We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give,' Winston Churchill once wrote. After being unsure whether we would be able to run this year's Christmas market with current volunteer capacity, we were grateful when the Aberlour Parish Church stepped up to partner with us to ensure it went ahead. Running such a big event safely requires the generous gift of time from an immense force of volunteers, but what a beloved and life-giving event it is for the village! We are thankful to everyone that contributed their time and talents, and glad so many braved the icy temperatures to join us.

One of the disappointing Christmas developments this year was a change in how Amey (the company responsible for maintaining the A95) supports communities in installing and removing Christmas lights. Historically, this service was offered to communities without charge. This year, the fee levied was a whopping £2,500. This sum did not include admin fees or power usage, and there are indications that they may be added to the annual bill going forward. With the small size of our organisation, it's not an annual expenditure we can sustain on our own, so we are actively looking for community sponsorship to ensure our new Christmas lights will be lit next year. We could also use help raising the issue with Richard Lochhead, our local MSP. If you would like to help with the future of the Christmas lights, please email us at info@aberlourcommunity.org.

In January, we distributed the latest instalment of Paul's Hill Windfarm Community Benefit Fund to support community-based projects undertaken by the Aberlour Tennis Club, Speyside Swimming Club, Aberlour Heritage Trail, Speyside Active Schools, Aberlour and District Pipe Band, Speyside Community Car Sharing, Aberlour Primary School (including the garden project), Aberlour Glebe Community Garden, Aberlour Community Association (new Christmas lights), Speyside High School, and Rainbows. Congratulations to all beneficiaries!

This spring, we are looking forward to hosting the first Aberlour Community Day, on Sunday, 24 March from 1PM-4PM (location tbc, likely Fleming Hall). Come and find out about all that Aberlour has to offer—clubs and societies for the young and old, exercise classes, volunteering opportunities, local council and community services, and much more. Aberlour Glebe Community Garden

While one might not think there is much to do over the winter months with a dormant community garden, in fact it's been an unexpectedly productive winter season for the glebe project—and we're grateful to the generous -hearted and community-minded people who have come together these past few months.

Braving the dreich weather in late November, a brilliant crew of volunteers met to prepare for a new community orchard. Many hands do make light work: within half an hour, we had forty holes dug! If you come to the glebe (adjacent the Alice Littler Memorial Carpark), you'll see a mixture of 40 heritage and commercial cooking and eating apples, heritage pears, and heritage plums. It'll take a few years before they bear fruit we can eat, but it's exciting to see them there and starting to grow.

In late January, we also took delivery of our new Polycrub, a hybrid of a polytunnel and greenhouse, a purchase made possible through the local council's Moray Community Health and Well-Being Fund, administered by tsiMORAY. We're looking forward to kitting it out so that we can start our own seeds (and keep those pesky deer away from our lettuces!).

Of course, part of the beauty of a community garden is the pleasure of getting one's hands in the dirt in the garden. Another part though, is the community that develops as people work together towards creating something that generations to come can share. In January, we had a small soup and sweet to thank people that had given their time and expertise this past year to make this community garden a reality. Whether it was offering the use of a trailer to collect pallets, or time building paths or weeding in the garden, or donating supplies, or consulting on issues related to land management or forestry, it really has been a community (and community-building) effort.



If you would like to get involved in our friendly, informal organisation, we are actively seeking new members. You do not need any expertise in gardening, just a desire to get your hands in the soil and meet some other folks from the village.

We hope everyone enjoyed the beautiful village Christmas Lights display. Grateful thanks to the volunteers who helped move the lights into position and assisted with traffic management, allowing Derek Gall (Contractor) and Richard Strathdee (Electrician) to safely erect and dismantle the Christmas Lights on Edward Avenue & Hill Street (Dufftown Road).

The village council purchased additional lights for Victoria Street and since the street is also the A95 trunk road, Amey Roads had to erect and dismantle them, which unfortunately is a cost the village council will have to bear every year. We have approached our MSP and Amey concerning means of reducing the cost of erecting and dismantling the 9 lights.

In late November the primary school children decorated umbrellas with lights and paraded down to the Highlander Playpark to sing some Christmas Carols. The parade was an amazing sight and the children really enjoyed the event. Funds raised at the event were split between the primary school and the Craigellachie Children's Christmas Party group.

On Sunday 3 March 2024 the village council is once again hosting a free Soup and Sweet Sunday Lunch for the over 60's living within the catchment area of Craigellachie Primary School. This is a good opportunity for our residents to get together with friends and neighbours for lunch. Watch out for the invite coming through your door and remember to return your reply.

Strathdee Properties generously agreed to again sponsor a fundraising Bottle Bingo in the village hall on **Friday 8th March 2024** - please note the change of date. We are grateful to Strathdee Properties for sponsoring this event and funds raised will be used for the maintenance of the village hall, football field, tennis courts, tennis pavilion and the ongoing cost of Christmas lights.

In an effort to improve energy efficiency within the village hall, we have installed thermal blinds on the windows. Hopefully this will make the hall cosier and assist with reducing our energy bills, which are currently an eye-watering £2,000 per month!

Many villagers were disappointed when Moray Council closed the Fiddich Park toilets a few years ago. The village council is considering the implications of taking over the seasonal running of the toilets, but we need to know if there is community support before making any commitment. There are a number of concerns, including how the toilets would be kept
